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












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Letter from Our Founder/CEO Debra Caudy, M.D.

We knew this was possible for him. What we didn't know was exactly how and where all of this was going to take place — until 29 Acres. We were even less certain he would be offered integrated employment opportunities and he now has, not one, but two part-time jobs where he is very much valued. As proud parents, we are so happy for him.

This independent and joyful life away from our family home is a reality for him and peace of mind for us.

As the person spearheading this effort, life lessons learned along the way are too numerous to count. My treasured Board members have stood with me during celebrations and also during disappointments graciously donating their time/support and innovative ideas. I am both empowered and thankful to travel this journey with them. 29 Acres has also been fortunate to align with sister organizations who have graciously helped us find our way when we got "stuck". We will do the same for others.

Our communities show a greater understanding and acceptance of those living with neurodiversity, making it possible to further our mission and to help others do the same.

I thank our dedicated community partners for fueling this important progress. I thank our terrific staff for making it all happen from the ground up.

Letter from Board Chair: Doug Bartek





Dear community partners,

2022 and also the end of 202I was a period of highlights for 29 Acres. We managed through COVID-I9 issues while increasing support services for residents and clients, built and opened two new houses at our living community in CrossRoads, opened a new Dallas hub serving day clients, expanded our original 29 acres by another I.7 acres with a neighboring land donation, and in spite of COVID, had

two very successful fund-raising functions. This report will review these highlights and others.

When Jodi and I had our third son in January of 1997, we had no idea of the journey that would begin for the family. Both our first two sons were in the "Gifted and Talented" programs in school, and when Ryan was diagnosed with autism at I8 months, we experienced all the emotions that families with someone on the spectrum inevitably go through. Since Jodi and I are both "older" parents, we began to worry early on about how Ryan would be cared for years into the future, how he could be kept mentally engaged and challenged when we could no longer take care of him, and how he could lead a happy and full life. Looking forward to when he would leave high school, we began a search for a housing community for him and found some great places – but none that specialized in adults on the autism spectrum and associated neurodiversities. We began to think we would have to try and build a community ourselves, but then divine intervention happened. We saw an article in the Dallas Morning News about a Highland Park couple, Debra Caudy and Clay Heighten, that had started such a community and had already purchased the land for houses in CrossRoads, Texas, very close to our house in Frisco. We quickly met with both of them, became infatuated with their enthusiasm and plans, and decided we had to become a part of this ground-breaking project. Fast-forward to now and Jodi is volunteering at 29 Acres weekly and Ryan was among the first two residents to move in to the housing community in the summer of 2020. He has loved it ever since and calls it "home."

29 Acres remains unique in its individual-based programming for residents, where each adult has their own level of personnel support, their own special-interest projects and their own individual work assignments. There is no "cookie-cutter/one idea fits all" at 29 Acres, yet everyone is part of a community and they enjoy social activities together with their peers.

Congratulations to the executive team led by Debra Caudy and Morgan McKay for building an incredible staff of highly-educated and skilled personnel who have done an outstanding job with our clients. Also, my sincere thanks to the entire board of directors – a talented group of individuals who meet regularly, provide thoughtful advice, and are always very generous in their donations to achieve our mission.

Currently, Raquel is finishing up her masters degree in education with a concentration in applied behavior analysis. She has worked with the neurodiverse population in many capacities prior as a case manager for local IDD services and as an ABA therapist. Raquel is originally from NYC but has lived in Texas for many years. She enjoys the outdoors, especially the beach and the mountains. 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29 Acres is a supportive environment for neurodiverse adults, many with autism spectrum disorder. We offer evidence-based and customized support services for each client to ensure tangible growth in areas of career readiness/employment, independent living, relationship building, physical health and emotional well-being.

The 29 Acres Difference

Our PURPOSE - to provide the support neurodiverse adults need to live a full and happy life.

Our PASSION - because our founders have children living with autism, we walk along this journey with our clients. We are resolute in our commitment to support the unique needs of each person and family we serve.

Our PROGRAMS - while we are autism-focussed, we provide services to neurodiverse adults with a variety of diagnoses. Based on the level of support each client requires, we customize our offerings to meet those needs.

Our programs include:



Transition Academy - a two-year, all-inclusive educational and residential program for high-functioning young adults 18 and up with autism, who need a longer runway to better prepare for independent living

Living Community - adults 18 and up can find a short-term or forever home at this living/learning environment designed to support and celebrate neurodiversity

Enrichment Services - a comprehensive and customized system of support available to residents of our living community and also to those who still live in their family homes

Employment Services - our vocational specialist and trained job coaches work with clients to establish goals, develop skills and find meaningful, integrated work experiences

Our PLACE - find us in Cross Roads, TX, just 30 minutes north of Dallas on 29 Acres of gently rolling, woods, meadows, and fields. Two lakes, two state parks, and IOO miles of walking and biking trails are nearby. We are also within minutes of two major universities and several dynamic North Texas communities. Additionally, we now have hubs in Denton and Dallas, expanding our service area to include much of North Texas.

Our NEED - Medicaid funding simply doesn't cover the cost to care for those living with autism or other neurodiversities. Private funding and fundraising are crucial to delivering on the 29 Acres mission. Whether it is the increasing cost of inflation to hire and retain the best and brightest, the cost of transportation for our clients or caring for 29 beautiful acres of land, we need the support of the community-at-large to ensure the quality of services we deliver day in and day out.

2022 Year in Review

Milestones and Accomplishments:

- 43/44 units at the Living Community are leased.
- Built and opened up two new houses-debt free!
- Opened up our Dallas Hub offering support services in Dallas for those still living in their family homes.
- 68 job placements this year, so far.
- Began fifth and largest class of TA with I4 freshman students.
- Continued growth of valuable partnerships with TWU and UNT.
- Added two additional BCBA's to the team!
- Launched Club 29 (our Thursday/Friday night social groups) in both Dallas and Denton.
- Moved the sophomore TA students into off-site apartment living.
- Built a one-acre organic garden, debt free.
- Had our first annual golf tournament which was a huge success!
- Sponsored a terrific documentary on autism called "In a Different Key".
- Spearheaded the advocacy effort on the use of HCS funding at 29 Acres and other intentional communities.
- Chosen as a finalist for the best nonprofit (medium sized) in DFW by D CEO.
- Alongside several other prestigious organizations in this space,
 29 Acres became a member of a Translational Research Consortium for Supportive Housing.







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2022 Snapshot

Exponential Growth for 29 Acres in 5 short years: Speaking to the Need.

29 Acres launched its first program in August of 2018 with its first nine students in our inaugural residential Transition Academy class. This was our first experience supporting someone living away from their family home.


In 2019, we launched our daytime support services (including employment services) in the Denton area wanting to capture the learning environment of a college town-the home to two, four-year public universities.

During the Covid-19 era, our supportive living community opened up. We experienced further growth by moving the majority of the residents into their new homes during the first wave of Covid-19, the summer of 2020. This effort necessitated flexibility and perseverance. Above all, we were tasked with helping to keep everyone safe and healthy in our living/learning environment during this unprecedented time. Thankfully, we were able to do that.

This year we launched our Dallas Hub and began offering daytime support services to those in the greater Dallas area.

Last, but not at all least, we launched our Thursday/Friday night socials in both Denton and Dallas locations: aka Club 29!

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Life at 29 Acres

Enrichment Services are available to residents at 29 Acres or to those still living in their family homes, through our day services. We currently have hubs in Denton and more recently in Dallas from which we offer daytime support services. These services are customized for the client and can include the full repertoire of "adult living" such as vocational/independent living and social support. Our support services are community-based which means that we work on desired skills/goals in the natural adult environment. In our Denton location, we are especially proud of our adaptive wake boarding program, which is offered to our clients during the summer season.

The Transition Academy

is a two-year residential program, and the goal is independence. This past August, we welcomed our 5th and largest class so far, having 14 freshman move-in! 2022 was also the first year that we had our second year students move into Elan apartments in Denton, presenting them with the opportunity to learn both house and apartment living and all the skills associated with each. They take their classes at Texas Woman's University, and our partnership and opportunities with the university continue to grow! During the program, we help clients get jobs, start college courses, begin certification programs, learn and practice independent living skills, and budget. Along with all the amazing practical skills they gain during the program, one of the coolest things is watching the friendships blossom!
